7/10 Cleveland

I landed near Raarn Holland
on barge about 25 feet from Sgt James Peterson a
1/4 my crew. Lt Roberts E & R P# 1967 Sgt
Warren and Sgt Hobson and Sgt
Lambousy had all landed within
a block of us. I set off with Lt
Roberts and we had full dinner.
We went to a farmhouse; told our story,
were given warm milk, and allowed
sleep in the hay loft.

The next day a man came
and told us he had transportation to
Barcelona. We went to another farmhouse
where we were given civilian clothes and at
the end of four hours he lead by the
Centersport organization came twelve
questionaires. We were joined by
Sgt Heldley E & R P# and that night
~~we~~ were all driven to the chief's home
in Amersfort. Two days later Lt

Hopkins E & R P# 1966 joined us.
We stayed there three weeks;
The chief's name was Geharius Otens
and he is in the police force. He took our
picture and got us ~~all~~ our I cards.

We then went to Deventer where
we spent two days with an architect
looking arched.

Then after

free hour stop in Landloven we
went on to Derna. Here we met
Jose, a smuggler, who promised
us much but who never did
more than ~~commonly~~ ask for our name
rank and serial number, so that
he could send a radio message.
He told us to stay with a ~~young~~
man in the Balafel fire department. We
were here three weeks.

Jose now moved us to a
cave at Amurka. We were here
two weeks. Jose had twenty-one
aviators hidden here, ~~but he~~
~~told~~ some of whom were Lt. Gao
~~Ex~~ & Lashan Lt. Edward Taylor ²⁰⁰¹ Sgt. Edgar
~~Ex~~ Taylor ²³⁸ and Sgt. Tom Farley. Although
one of us were here moved away
Jacques Jose's henchman at
Amurka. After two weeks here we
moved on to farms at Derna for
another two weeks. In this farm
we met Sksr. Jack Loub and three
of his officers. He had been
plot down on his last mission.
We were all thoroughly fed up
with Jose. We took ~~all~~ ^{all} of his gear
to border on bicycles, and Vern

a short man with a moustache, took
six by train to Waastrecht amongst
them Hopkins & Roberts. Six
more were to follow, but Jaeger
had a friend connected with
a Belgian line and we wanted
to see Jose.

A truck took us to an
undergrounders shack in the woods
near to German border. Five of us were
here three days. The truck driver,
a member of the Armee Blanche,
~~had~~ came from Brussels and gave
us Belgian I cards. We left
went to Gubbenvorst for three days
and lived with a wood worker (first week
in June) A car took us to Sevenum
where we lived in chicken houses.
We met a Dutch army captain who thought
he could send us out on a line intended
for Frenchmen escaping from Germany.
During the three weeks that we were here
he sold our pictures near Armond.

We cycled to Grootbedarf
and stayed in a chateau there. The
chateau had belonged to a Mrs. Dubois,
now deceased, and his elderly daughter
~~had~~ lived there. Lt Leo Williams

~~27 & 28 referred to before~~

Eddie Taylor ~~28 & 29 Rpt#~~ and ~~27~~ ~~28~~ Tom Garry were all here. Lt Haupt, a navigator, was here with J. W. Foth and Mansell Williams, both English. A few days later Richard Garry, RCAF joined us. We were here two weeks, and during this time our pictures came from Severnham. The young schoolmastes here worked hard on us. Three underdykers were also here.

Hans At midnight on 4 July, with guides, we crossed the border 20 km S Grootbedas. There was a full moon, and as we walked through the woods we were shot at by the Belgian police, but no one was hit and after hiding an hour we joined the White Army. The took 8 ten of us to a place in the woods 8 km from Mossiac (sic). We were about ten days, 150 Russians were supposed to be hiding nearby.

Richard Grood was our spokesman and a member of the White Army told him that ~~for~~ of us could take the train & travel

Our old T cards, were collected
and we were given new ones
which used the Sevenum photos. We
went to a house nearby and caught
a tram. Two of us were following
a man and the other three two
girls in the White Cross.
^{Gerry, Rita, Leo and Maxwell Williams and}
We ~~were~~ arrived in Treves
and went to a restaurant. The first
time it was closed, so we walked
about here for four hours. We returned
and went upstairs where we met a
slab blond woman named Marie. She
had been tortured by the Germans
who had put an iron mask on her
face and had taken out the
teeth on one side of her mouth.
She told us we were going to France
to meet a British intelligence officer
in the Ardennes. She took us
by train through Namur
to the border near Givet. She was
doing this on her own initiative,
because the magnus of Givet,
which was to give us papers, had
been caught and the line was
therefore broken at the border.
We crossed the border.

in broad daylight by just following the road and past a stone marker.

We stopped at the first cafe and met a man in the Belgian army and Elaine, a 5 ft 5 in Brunette. Then we went onto a little town for three days. Marie had no contacts, she just stopped a milkman and asked them to help. As they were talking a magnusard appeared who warned him that he would be shot if he did not stop selling milk to the Germans. Marie left two men with the milkman and the other three of us with a French family.

All these people were afraid of the Germans and felt that it would be better that we be few than that they be shot for keeping us. When Wilem had returned three days later, she was still without contacts and we went back to Belgium. This time we followed a railroad track across the border, and although a German was standing here, she said nothing. Marie took him into a magasin which claimed

I made a long trip Switzerland. See off
to far of us took train and went
back to Messina (sic) & collected the
remaining five. The Magyar had
us to Elaine. We slept in the woods
or in open under the care for a week.
The Swiss line was no good it appears
Elaine contacted Ernest of
Aymont and he let us sleep
in his barn for three or four days.
A White Army man came to us one
day in the woods for a talk. Then
Elaine returned and sent Garrelly
& Forte off on a new line, we were
to follow them.

A day later Elaine took us
to meet to White Army man who
had already talked to us in the
woods. He led us further into
the woods and turned us over to
another man. He took us to a
small town to a man named Ernest
who whom Leo Williams stayed. Here
we met Vic, local chief of the
White Army. He took one of our
dog tags & Mansell Williams and I
went on to Faron where he

joined Fidèle and Garret. I went on
of another house where I found
St Robert Grace 28th Sept. He
had already been here ~~two~~^{two}
months. I stayed a month until
the American Troops arrived.
While I was here Angel Hubot
rue de Perru (Paris?) Lanson, was
wonderful to us. From here on
my story is to some extent Grace's.

SUBJECT: Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

TO: The Commanding Generals,
Army Ground;
Army Air Forces;
The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area;
The Commanding Generals,
Theaters of Operations;
Defense Commands;
Departments;
Base Commands;
The Commanding Officers,
Base Commands;
Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

1. Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and releases.

2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repatriation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.

3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attachés are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.

4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.

5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapees, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supercedes letter, AG 388.6 (5 Nov 48) OB-S-B-M, 7 November 1948, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

1. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore *SECRET*.

2. a You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attaché to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.

- (1) The names of those who helped you.
- (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
- (3) The route you followed.
- (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.

b You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.

c You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.

d You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.

e No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the theater.

GERTIFICATE

I have read the above and certify that I will comply with it.

I understand that any information concerning my escape or evasion from capture is *SECRET* and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A. C. of S., G-2, War Department, the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations, or to the Military Attaché in a neutral country to whom I first report. I understand that disclosure to anyone else will make me liable to disciplinary action.
