The records of this office reveal that you may have knowledge of the fate of an American Sergeant who parachuted to the ground on or about 29 June 1944, in the vicinity of Lobnitz (Glotche), Germany. It appears that the aviator was brutally murdered by the Germans.

Please furnish this office with a detailed statement of all the facts within your knowledge concerning the fate of this American aviator.

Gentlemen:

I have very little information to offer you with regard to the murder of the other flier who bailed out with me on 29 June 1944. After we bailed out, I neither saw nor heard of him again. Your letter is the first time that I've heard that he was murdered.

As a matter of fact, that mission was the first time I flew with him and I didn't even get to learn his name before we left the ship.

On the other hand, my capture by the Germans was effected near Bernburg with all due civility. Compared to the fate of other fliers, I was extremely lucky.

I wish I could be of more assistance but I just never heard of him after we bailed out.
