Our target was a JU-88 assembly plant at Eislegen, Cermany. Just about the time we left our bombs go, we were hit by flak and we had to drop out of formation. We header for home, but when we were over the Zuider Zee, our engines quit. We decided to head but toward land, and the order was given to bale out when we were no longer over water.

Lt. Armour, the radio operator, therengineer and I black out near Hulst, pelgium.

I landed in a medow, picked up my chute and ran for some civilians standing in the field.

They took my chute, harness and mae west but indicated that Germans were in the area.

I began running across the fields for about a mile. When I came to a road, I hid in the field until nightfall not wishing to cross the highway in daylight.

That night I started S, and after walking about three miles, came to a flooded area and had to retrace my steps. I then met a man on a bicycle who appeared friendly. After I told him that I was American, he took me to a cafe in a small village, gave me civilian clothes and arranged to hide me in a house in the flooded aria. I was taken to the house by rowboat and from that point on my hourney was arranged.

From the farmhouser in the facoded area I was taken by two policemen to the home of MARIA WESEMARI, Zeelands of NewWerlands, near Hulst, Belgium.
I remained there until 9 July.

From 9 July to 12 July I stayed at the home of GEORGE SMET, St Nicolas, Belgium. A Mr. Van Noeh, St Nicolas, apperaed to be head of the organization in that district.

I was leter taken to the home of OCTAAF DE BOEUER, Langvelde, 26, Zele, Belgium, where I remained until that area was liberated.

Amended Instructions Concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War, to Include Evaders of Capture in Enemy or Enemy-Occupied Territory and Internees in Neutral Countries.

TO:

The Commanding Generals,

Army Ground; Army Air Forces;

The Commander-in-Chief, Southwest Pacific Area:

The Commanding Generals,

Theaters of Operations;

Defense Commands;

Departments;

Base Commands; The Commanding Officers,

ne Commanding Officers, Base Commands;

Director, Bureau of Public Relations.

- Publication or communication to any unauthorized persons of experiences of escape or evasion from enemy-occupied territory, internment in
 a neutral country, or release from internment not only furnishes useful information to the enemy but also jeopardizes future escapes, evasions and
 releases.
- 2. Personnel will not, unless authorized by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, publish in any form whatever or communicate either directly, or indirectly, to the press, radio or an unauthorized person any account of escape or evasion of capture from enemy or enemy-occupied territory, or internment in a neutral country either before or after repartiation. They will be held strictly responsible for all statements contained in communications to friends which may subsequently be published in the press or otherwise.
- 3. Evaders, escapees, or internees shall not be interrogated on the circumstances of their experiences in escape, evasion or internment except by the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff. G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations. In allied or neutral countries, American Military Attaches are authorized to interrogate on escape, evasion and internment matters.
- 4. Should the services of escaped prisoners of war, evaders, or internees be deemed necessary for lecturing and briefing, such services will be under the direct supervision of the agency designated by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, War Department General Staff, or the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations.
- 5. Commanding Officers will be responsible for instructing all evaders, escapecs, and internees in the provisions of this directive which supersedes letter, AG 383.6 (6 Nov 42) OB-S-B-M. 7 November 1942, subject: Instructions concerning Publicity in Connection with Escaped Prisoners of War and other previous instructions on this subject.

- 1. Information about your escape or your evasion from capture would be useful to the enemy and a danger to your friends. It is therefore SEGRET.
- 2. a You must therefore not disclose, except to the first Military Attache to whom you report, or to an officer designated by the Commanding General of the Theater of Operations, or by A. C. of S., G-2, W. D.
 - (1) The names of those who helped you.
 - (2) The method by which you escaped or evaded.
 - (3) The route you followed.
 - (4) Any other facts concerning your experience.
 - You must be particularly on your guard with persons representing the press.
 You must give no account of your experiences in books, newspapers, periodicals or in broadcasts or in lectures.
 - d You must give no information to anyone, irrespective of nationality, in letters or in conversation, except as specifically directed in Par. 4.
- No lectures or reports are to be given to any unit without the permission of A. C. of S., G-2, W. D., or corresponding organization in the

theater.

GERTIFIGATE

I have read the above and certify that I will comply with it.

I understand that any information concerning my escape or ecasion from capture is SEGRET and must not be disclosed to anyone other than the agency designated by A. C. of S., G-2, War Department, the corresponding organization in overseas theaters of operations, or to the Military Attache in a neutral country to whom I first report. I understand that disclosure to anyone else will make me liable to disciplinary action.
